LET THIS PLACE RESOUND!

As I stated in last month's Musings, what an exciting time for Saint James Music Ministry. Since that writing we have rededicated the Ross King organ in the church with much fanfare and uplifting music and we have heard the inaugural recital played brilliantly by our own **Barbara Gray-Massey** on September 19.

People continue to be amazed at the sounds of the "new" organ and how it supports and encourages the congregation in song. The many tonal colors of the instrument were in full aural display at Barbara's recital and those in attendance were able to see all the gyrations that an organist does in playing the King of Instruments.

The ever-eloquent **Ross King** said it best: "The church made a wise investment in having the M. P. Möller firm of Hagerstown, MD, build an organ in 1959. (How many electronics would they have had in those same 51 years?) This came



home to me forcefully on hearing the recitalist for [the] inaugural recital go through her remarkably varied and colorful program.

"When we came to the organ a couple of years ago, it was in fairly good order, but it had

limitations in both effectiveness and in color which we have attempted to improve in our just-completed work.

"We replaced the pneumatically-powered parts of the console with new (and additional) drawknobs and tilting tablets, new (and additional) pistons, and new solid-state switching system and multilevel combination action. This made the console movable so that the organist has better position for directing the choir and also the possibility of being visible for recitals.

"The church has, in addition to the results of an investment made half a century ago for a fine building and organ, one additional asset: its theory about personnel, whether employed, constituent, or visiting. It has been our observation while working on the organ, made strictly as outsiders and made in the awareness that we are dealing here with a subject that is outside our range of expertise, that the parish spends little time on divisive issues and that the parish searches out persons, both lay and clergy, of high ability and then provides them with the resources and also a cheerful, non-hierarchical atmosphere in which to pursue their interests and to develop their talents."

Thank you, Ross and Saint James Parish for bringing about this wonderful addition to our Music Ministry. *Soli Deo Gloria* (to God alone be the Glory), indeed!



EXTENDING OUR ECW HANDS TO COTS

Eight women: Linda Shannon, Amanda Phillips, Linda Kurth, Joan Hemsworth, Carolyn Hoey, Norma Smereka, Pat Darin, and Carol Nankervis, traveled to Detroit to tour COTS (Coalition on Temporary Shelter) and meet with the staff there. The St. James women saw the infant and toddler Day Care rooms, the lunch room, and toured the halls. They learned about the volunteer programs and the structured and very organized requirements for assistance...all of which provide a safe environment for the residents.

According to several of our ECW women, the highlight of the trip was meeting one of the women residents and hearing her story and hopes for the future... even in the face of major abdominal tumor related health problems. The middle aged woman told our group that when her husband died suddenly of a heart attack three years ago, she had to move into a less expensive apartment building. Unfortunately, soon after her relocation, she began to suffer from severe bed bug bites which covered her whole body. When she sought medical treatment, the landlord became angry and the spiral of homelessness began. The landlord agent hit her and threw her belongings on the street.

Luckily, the police referred her to COTS, where she has been for the past sixteen months. She sews and is an artist. When the St. James group volunteered to update and personalize her very small 10' x 14' COTS room, she replied that she had been praying for someone to do just that!

Excitedly, ECW committed itself to do more than just send our usual monetary contribution. After talking with the resident, a "needed" list was made, which includes painting her room and bath in pastels.

Please, help us be the answer to this woman's prayers.



Around 190 people were served for a total cost of \$324.47, which included \$45 for security! Sacred Heart will share the cost, so our half will be \$162.24 for this meal! Most of the food was gone but the bit of sloppy joe mix which was left, went to the Detroit Rescue Mission

Our next turn to prepare the meal and set up at Spirit of Hope, will be Saturday, October 23rd.
